

Culture

noun

- the quality in a person or society that arises from a concern for what is regarded as excellent in arts, letters, manners, scholarly pursuits, etc.
- that which is excellent in the arts, manners, etc.
- a particular form or stage of civilization, as that of a certain nation or period: Greek culture.
- development or improvement of the mind by education or training.

verb (used with object), cul·tured, cul·tur·ing.

- to subject to culture; cultivate.
- *Biology*.to grow (microorganisms, tissues, etc.) in or on a controlled or defined medium.
- to introduce (living material) into a <u>culture medium</u>.

Origin of the word

1400-50

Late Middle English:

tilling, place tilled (< Anglo-French) < Latin *cultūra*.

Culture is an umbrella term which encompasses
the <u>social behavior</u> and <u>norms</u> found
in <u>human societies</u>, as well as the knowledge, beliefs,
arts, laws, customs, capabilities and habits of the
individuals in these groups.^[1]
