




Origin of the word

First recorded use in the English language was in the 14th Century

The word is from the Latin adjective adversarius ("turned toward" or "antagonistic toward"), which in turn can be traced back to the verb advertere, meaning "to turn to." "Advertere" itself derives from adand vertere ("turn"), and "vertere" is the source of a number of English words. Along with obvious derivatives like "inadvertently" and "adverse" are some surprises, such as "anniversary," "prose," and "vertebra," among others.











