
# Word of the week

# **Inscrutable** [in-**skroo**-t*uh*-b*uh*]

### Word class and definitions

*adjective* incapable of being investigated, analyzed, or scrutinized; impenetrable.

not easily understood; mysterious; unfathomable: *an inscrutable smile*.

incapable of being seen through physically; physically impenetrable: *the inscrutable depths of the ocean*.

## Root words In + scrutable

#### In

a prefix of Latin origin which corresponds to the English *un-,* having a negative or privative force, freely used as an English formative, especially of adjectives and their derivatives and of nouns

#### scrutable

*adjective* capable of being understood by careful study or investigation.

## A bit more on the word 'in'

As a prefix, the word 'In' has a transformative effect on words. Usually creating an opposite or negative.

Think about the word *visible*, which simply means that it can be seen; if we had the prefix 'in' it becomes *invisible*, and thus changing the word completely to mean the opposite – cannot be seen.

As a class, see how many words can be transformed by adding the prefix 'in'. Here's another to get you going....correct + in = incorrect ©

# Examples of *Inscrutable* used in sentences

She could tell nothing by his face, which was calm and inscrutable.

She has been watching the preceding incident with inscrutable eyes.


Jaska merely smiled her inscrutable smile, and did not answer.

#### Origin of the word


ORIGIN OF INSCRUTABLE First recorded in 1400–50; late Middle English word from Late Latin word *inscrūtābilis,* which means unknowable or entirely mysterious.
